## Tips for Turf



### Watering

- New lawns require frequent watering to become established
- Every 1 to 2 days for the first 3 to 4 weeks, then 1 inch per week (Put tin can in yard to measure time it takes to fill to 1 inch)
- Early in the morning to avoid evaporation
- Established cool season lawns should be allowed to go dormant in the heat of summer

### Mowing

- Never mow more than 1/3 of the leaf blade at any mowing event
- Sharpen mower blades every 10 to 20 uses
- Avoid mowing during drought or when wet
- Return grass clippings to the lawn (don't need to bag)

### Fertilizing

- Do a soil test first. Pick up kit at Extension office or library
- In the fall, September through November
- Consider slow release fertilizers to minimize leaching
- Avoid over-fertilizing
- Keep fertilizer off sidewalks, driveways, streets, etc.

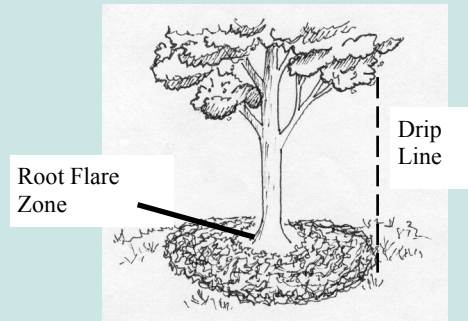
## Tips for Trees

### Watering

- Water heavily once a week during periods of no rain
- Use hose and let water run slowly to soak in. Run for about an hour.

### Mulching

- Make sure mulch is at least 3 inches away from base of tree trunk. You should see the flare at the base of the tree.
- Mulch should be 3 inches deep out to the edge of the drip line—do not over-mulch
- Refresh mulch every 2 years as necessary



### Fertilizing

- Usually not necessary!
- Check with Extension office or library for a soil kit to test the soil for needed nutrients before you fertilize

### Other

- Do not prune newly planted trees for 1 to 2 years unless they have dead, damaged or diseased parts
- Remove any stakes, holding wires after one year

## Tips for Shrubs

### Watering

- New shrubs require more frequent watering for the first 3 years to become established
- 1 inch per week (approx. 1 to 3 gallons) per plant depending on size
- Early in the morning to avoid evaporation

### Mulching

- Apply mulch or shredded leaves no more than 3 inches deep
- Keep mulch away from base of plant

### Fertilizing

- Check with Extension office or library for a soil kit to test the soil for needed nutrients before you fertilize



### Other:

- Watch for signs of wilting leaves
- Look for pest/disease damage: holes in leaves, dark spots, etc.
- Look for insects under leaf or along branches
- Prune when needed according to shrub type (mounding, tree-like, cane)
